The Artist's Studio: Shadow Stories

Who are these people? What is this place? What will happen next?

Materials

- Large sheet of paper or an unfolded grocery bag
- Markers, crayons, or pencils
- Assorted objects (toys, blocks, etc.)

Play with light and shadow as you make your own drawing inspired by this mysterious artwork. Place small figures, blocks, toys, or other objects with interesting shapes on a large piece of paper. Shine a flashlight onto the objects (or place them in the sunlight) and look at the shadows they cast. Experiment with the placement of the objects and angle of the light source to create long and short shadows. Use your favorite mark-making tools to trace and color the shadow-shapes.
